Young People's Mental Health – Building resilience

One of our main focuses this past month has been on developing mental health within the theme of 'connecting meaningfully'. In light of the difficulties faced by so many young people around the world during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Pastoral Team have been delivering assemblies on the ways we can connect with each other both in and out of school. Other areas of focus have included mental health awareness and overall wellbeing for young people and ideas related to self-care, where and how to seek support, planning physical, emotional, social and practical activities, dealing with stress and anxiety. The main aims are clearly to generate a greater sense of awareness as well as what to look out for in both themselves and others in the community who may need our support. Ultimately, we hope to engage our students even further in this important area of concern but also to maintain the matter of emotional and mental wellbeing as a constant in school life with a view to enabling our young people to have confidence in moving forward and to understand and adopt the tools they will need to develop resilience and overall mental health along with care for others both now and in their future lives. Many thanks to all Form Tutors, Heads of Year/KS Leaders and our School Psychologist, Ms Artemis Theophanous for their hard work in supporting this strategy.



In addition to the above, it is also important to mention our Year 12 students, Lara Baghdjian, Christina Orphanidi, Danae Aletra, Chrysi Mavromati and Anthea Damali and their much appreciated contributions. The New Parents evening was organised early in the term where were able to present to our Year 7 parents and carers the essentials regarding expectations and advice for their children as they begin their Senior School careers. Key Stage 4 parents were able to attend an event at school to gain some insight into the challenges of Year 10 and 11 as their children embark on IGCSE courses or, in the case of Year 11, begin the rapid approach to completion of courses and readiness for Mocks in January and public exams next summer.

We were also delighted to communicate with parents regarding an exciting collaboration with the University of Cyprus. Our Year 8 students will have the opportunity to join the Multipliers Project where they will be part of a real-life scientific research project and will interact with science professionals as well as carrying out data collection. Via open community events, they will share their findings and publicly reflect on implications for the local community and European society as a whole. Year 8s who volunteer to join the Multipliers Project will be involved in laboratory activities, field-trips to laboratories and science-related institutions to interact with experts, science outreach and communication activities. The project is funded by the Horizon H2020 programme of the European Union. Many thanks to Ms Iordanou for leading this initiative.

Our school's Mathematics Department has been actively participating in the International Mathematics and Science Competition "Euromath - Euroscience" for the past two years with great success.

In 2021, Elisaveta Bobrova (Y12), Carolina Pastella (Y11) and Josephina Pastella (Y11), managed to win second place in the Euromath Presentation Competition making us all very proud!!
