Our students recently participated in the EYP event at Ayios Georgios Lyceum in Larnaca where we joined several other schools to qualify for the National event in August 2024 and hopefully as in previous years, qualify to represent Cyprus overseas in the final round of debates.

Students prepared and debated their resolution on Accessing Accession in the European Union, with a focus on the following question, With countries in the Western Balkans in the running to join the European Union for more than a decade, and several countries from the Eastern Partnership (EaP) receiving Candidate Status, what could the EU do to encourage transparency and efficiency within Candidate States during the process of accession? Our team were successful in having their resolution passed by 37 votes in favour, 34 against and 1 abstention. A hotly contested topic!


Gender Equality
